## Remembering Bobby Lee Webster

On Wednesday October 29, 2009 the Key Camp lost one of its charter members when Compatriot Bobby Lee Webster passed away at age 77. Bob was very active in the camp by attending meetings, parades, and helped with several Mine Creek workdays before his health began to wane. He was retired from TWA after serving 31 years as a pilot. For his military service in the Air Force during the Korean War he was awarded the SCV War Service Medal, one of the highest awards given by the SCV. His other SCV award was the SCV Commendation Medal presented to him in 2002. In addition to the SCV, Bob was also a member of the Delaware Crossing Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution. Bob was one of the ten founders of the camp and he will be greatly missed. Rest in peace Bobby.

## Leavenworth Veterans Day Parade

It was an awesome day for a parade on Wednesday 11 November. It was Veterans Day. The sun was shining and the sky was clear. The temperature was about 60 degrees and there was a slight wind. It could not have been more perfect. The Major Thomas J. Key Camp #1920, Sons of Confederate Veterans, and the Franklin Camp #5, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War had a joint entry in the official Mid-western Veterans Day Parade in Leavenworth, Kansas. It is the largest Veterans Day parade in the mid-west and one of the largest in the country. Our line number was 123, the 123<sup>rd</sup> entry in the parade. They were a whole bunch more behind us. The parade started at 10:30 a.m. but it was 11:00 before number 123 stepped off. The Key Camp was represented by Compatriots Paul Allen, Merle Leech, Carl Linck, Loren Lundy, Lane Smith (in Yankee blue) and Spike Speicher. The entry consisted of Carl's 1983 Johnson Motors Presidential Rumble Seat Roadster with Carl driving and Loren (100 years old last August) in

the passenger seat. Loren was a great hit in his Confederate uniform waving to all the people. Every time the parade stopped, which was very often with a parade that large, Carl would announce the Loren was our oldest camp member at 100 years old and the spectators would go wild. The Color Guard was lead by Merle, resplendent in his Confederate officer's uniform. The Color Guard consisted of Paul carrying the Confederate battle flag and Spike as the Confederate guard. Dave Tollefson in Union uniform carried the U.S. flag with Lane as the Union guard. It was a long parade and there were literally thousands of spectators. We received tremendous applause all along the parade route. I want to thank all of you that participated in this parade. We got our flag out before the people and that's what it's all about.
